They are used only when hydroelectric power cannot fully cover periods when wind and solar energy are low.

Are photovoltaic solar power plants legal in Uruguay?

A number of photovoltaic solar power plants have been built. The use of nuclear energy in Uruguay is prohibited by law 16.832 of 1997.

Does Uruguay need a thermal power plant?

The country's thermal power plants rarely need to be activated, except when natural resources are insufficient. Half of Uruguay's electricity is generated in the country's dams, and 10% percent comes from agricultural and industrial waste and the sun.
